
Space is limited and available slots will be allotted on a first-come, firstserved basis, so please register early. We'll see you in camp!

Inhibitor Family Camp™ Program FAQs

Who can attend Inhibitor Family Camp?

Children ages 6-18 living with an active inhibitor who have not successfully tolerized, and their immediate families are encouraged to attend. Because inhibitors have been known to return after just weeks or months after tolerization, children who have had a successful immune tolerance experience within the past three years or less will also be welcomed to attend.

My child's inhibitor has been tolerized. Why can't we attend?

Typically, children with a tolerized inhibitor can attend "regular" hemophilia camp with few restrictions. Inhibitor Family Camp is designed for those individuals that are often the only one with an inhibitor at camp, or who can't attend at all.

Are adults with an inhibitor invited to attend?

We encourage you to sign up for our 2 adult programs, Leverage and Momentum, as well as the Inhibitor Summits sponsored by NHF.

How much does it cost to attend?

There are no fees associated with attending Inhibitor Family Camp. Travel related expenses including tolls, mileage and parking will be reimbursed. Air transportation will be arranged for you. All meals will be provided on site.

How will this experience be different than Inhibitor Summits?

Inhibitor Summits provided by NHF have been an invaluable experience for individuals and families living with an inhibitor. Summits have provided for so many of us the opportunity to feel as though we belong again in our own community.

Families at summits have often expressed the desire to have more unstructured time with each other to build a stronger community of support. A family camp atmosphere creates a sense of belonging through shared activities and experiences where minds and bodies are engaged.

Where will we sleep?

Families have their own side of a large cabin, with twin or bunkbeds with separate bathrooms and a shared living room space. Bed linens, pillows and towels will be provided.



Will the location be accessible to wheelchairs and other mobility devices?

Absolutely!

Will there be medical coverage?

There will be a Nursing Director on duty all weekend. In addition, two highly skilled nurses, each with hemophilia and inhibitor experience, will be attending Inhibitor Family Camp and teaching self-infusion classes.

What should I bring?

Your child's factor and supplies, as there will not be any on site. Also bring your enthusiasm and willingness to reach out so we can learn from each other!

Will child care be available?

One to two counselors will be assigned to your family whose job it will be to show you around the camp, as well as to bring your children to activities so that parents may attend sessions.

What about patient confidentiality?

Information that you share or hear will be treated with the utmost respect and never disclosed without your permission. We want participants to feel comfortable so that we may support one another.

How does CHES fund programming?
